The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards were launched in 1923 to encourage and recognize student achievement in the creative arts. The Scholastic Awards attract over 350,000 entries in 28 categories of writing and the visual arts.

Voter Registration Event, Jessica Regitano

This drive took place at WHS this September and aimed to highlight the importance of voting and to actively engage students throughout the school. The event featured activities for juniors and seniors in the auditorium, including a voter registration slideshow and a discussion with Onondaga County Board of Elections Commissioners (both Democrat and Republican), followed by an opportunity to complete voter registration forms for those old enough to vote. Freshmen and sophomores participated in voter trivia and raffles in the cafeteria during their lunch periods. The initiative was also supported by a complimentary Democracy in a Box, provided by The Civics Center.

Mylisa Larsen Author Visit, Aneisa Linton

This grant supported a visit by children's book author Mylisa Larsen. During her visit, she presented to all students at both Walberta Park and Cherry Road schools and talked about the process of writing books and being a reader. She also attended the book fair at Walberta Park School to meet with students and sign books.

Insights and Inspirations with Angie Thomas, Penny Feeney and Jessica Regitano In April 2025, award-winning author Angie Thomas will be visiting Syracuse to speak as part of the Friends of the Central Library (FOCL) author series. This grant will allow 45 students from grades 8-12 to see Ms. Thomas speak in person. This grant supports a new initiative at WHS. Trivia Tuesdays is an 8-part monthly trivia series taking place after school. Teams include a WHS staff member and up to four students who compete to earn monthly prizes. Trivia Tuesdays provides a way for teachers and students to engage in team building and create a sense of camaraderie and school spirit. Pandora's Suitcase, Jen Stanton

With support from this grant, all students at Walberta Park School were able to see a performance of Pandora's Suitcase, put on by Syracuse Stage. The play covers topics such as anxiety and teaches children how to ask for help and be confident in themselves.

Insights and Inspirations with Varian Johnson, Penny Feeney

This grant will support a visit to OHMS from award-winning author, Varian Johnson. Prior to this visit students will have the opportunity to engage with the author's books in various ways, such as a reading to all of the 6th graders and the very popular Spin it to Win it trivia game. On the day of the visit, there will be a breakfast and lunch that students will have the opportunity to be chosen to attend to get to interact with the author. This grant provides an immersive opportunity for students and encourages them to become actively engaged readers.

Hatching Chicks, Jen Stanton In March 2025 all first grade classrooms at Walberta Park school will have the opportunity to care for eggs and experience the beginning of a chicken's lifecycle. This grant will provide funding for all necessary items (eggs, incubators, aquariums etc) for students to be able to participate in this educational and memorable experience.

1,000,000 Trees, Aneisa Linton

This grant will support bringing author/artist/speaker Kristen Balouch to speak to students at Walberta Park and Cherry Road schools. The author will visit in April, the month of Earth Day and Arbor Day, to share her true story of planting 1,000,000 trees with her family to reforest an island in the Pacific Northwest that had been clear cut through logging. She will share her writing process and provide inspiration to students for writing and creating books.

Transportation to Nonpublic Schools

Following the guidelines of Section 3635 of New York State Education Law, the Westhill Central School District is advising the parents of students seeking transportation to a nonpublic school that a written request must be submitted to the Westhill Board of Education by April 1st of the preceding year. New residents may submit their request after the April 1st deadline, but must do so within thirty days after establishing residence in the district and must also submit a residency affidavit. The school board may refuse to grant a late transportation request form may be received directly from the nonpublic school at the time of enrollment and must be completed and received at the Westhill Central School District prior to April 1, 2024. The transportation request form and residency affidavit may be found on the Westhill CSD website under Transportation.

On days in which public schools are scheduled to be closed, in accordance with the Westhill School District calendar, the district is not obligated to transport to the nonpublic schools. Under no circumstances may transportation be provided on legal holidays or Saturdays.

Notice of Availability of Asbestos Management Plan

As provided under the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act, (AHERA-EPS 40 CFR 763), Westhill Central School District hereby makes known the steps it has undertaken to comply with AHERA and the availability of asbestos management plans.

- 1. Beginning in 1989, all district owned facilities were inspected for asbestos and management plans were developed for each building according to the requirements of AHERA. Triennial reinspections are conducted every three years. Onondaga-Cortland-Madison BOCES of Syracuse, NY completed the 2004 AHERA Triennial inspection and update to the asbestos management plans.
- 2. Periodic Surveillance of asbestos containing building materials is conducted every six months.
- 3. All custodial and maintenance staff have undergone 2-hour Asbestos Awareness Training.
- 4. All response actions taken are within federal and state guidelines.

Universal Pre-K - 2025-2026 School Year

The Westhill Central School District is pleased to once again offer a 4-year-old UPK program for the 2025-2026 school year.

To be eligible, a child must:

- Have a birthdate between December 2, 2020 and December 1, 2021.
- Reside in the Westhill Central School District.
- Agree to attend the program 6 hours a day for 5 days per week.

Instruction is consistent with the New York State Pre-Kindergarten Standards, which focuses on a child's social/emotional, cognitive and physical development.

Those who submit an interest form online and complete the registration process between January 20 and March 31 will be considered for the lottery selection process to be held in early April. If there are more students interested than seats available, a random, computerized lottery will be held. All families will be contacted to be updated on their child's status of accepted or waitlisted. Registration packets will be mailed to accepted families after the lottery is conducted.

It is important to note the UPK Program is not housed in Westhill Central School District school buildings. Instead, as in the past, the district has partnered with the YMCA (OCC campus location) and Bellevue Heights Nursery School. Transportation to and from the program is the responsibility of parents/guardians. Students must attend the program five days a week to maintain their seat.
