



Capital Project Update

On May 21, 2019, voters approved the next Capital Project (Phases 2 and 3) for the Westhill Central School District. The project continues with the renovations of the 1st and 2nd floors of the high school. The previous Capital Project (Phase 1) renovated and transformed the 3rd floor high school academic wing, the first renovation since the school was built in 1962.

Additional components of the Capital Project are slated for Walberta Park, Cherry Road and Onondaga Hill Middle Schools as necessary to meet the future-ready learning needs of all students, the safety and security for all students and staff and the facility needs for long-term building operation and maintenance.

The project is being divided into two phases to accommodate proper planning, development and approval as required by the New York State Education Department.

Current Estimated Project Schedule:

Phase 2 Design: June 2019 – December 2019

Phase 2 State Education Department Review/Approval: January 2020 – December 2020

Phase 2 Construction: March 2021 – September 2022

Phase 3 Design: September 2019 – September 2020

Phase 3 State Educational Department Review/Approval: January 2021 – December 2021

Phase 3 Construction: March 2022 – December 2023

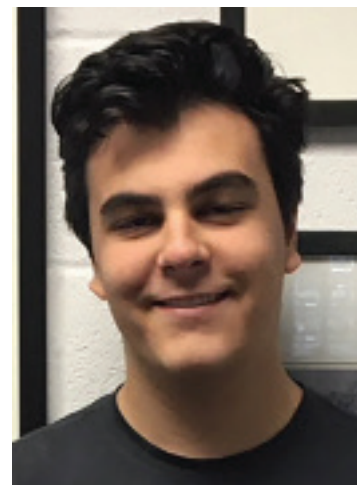

Over two weeks in July and August, eighty camper-musicians, fifty counselors and six music educators from Westhill, Baldwinsville, Christian Brothers Academy, Fayetteville-Manlius, Bishop Ludden, Marcellus, Chittenango, Phoenix, St. John Fisher, St. Rose, Nazareth, St. Joseph's, Syracuse City, Syracuse Diocese and Syracuse University performed together in the Westhill Summer Band Camp, Jazz Camp and Masterclass Workshops at Westhill High School. The camps were hosted by Westhill Instrumental Music Department teachers, Mrs. Elizabeth Buell, Mr. Corey Riley and Mrs. Erin Tapia.

The Westhill Band Masterclass Workshop took place from July 30-August 1 and is an outgrowth of the Westhill Master Artist Series sponsored by the Westhill Educational Foundation in 2016. The concept for both programs was to create a personalized and targeted instructional experience held in small like-instrument classes taught by exceptional educators specializing on that instrument. The three day summer workshop culminated in a final performance featuring flute, clarinet, saxophone, brass and percussion performances in a variety of configurations as well as performances throughout the camp by our amazing masterclass band teachers and coordinators: Mrs. Buell (camp coordinator & saxophones), Mr. Riley (brass) and Mrs. Tapia (flute) from Westhill; Ms. Grethel (clarinet) from Phoenix; and Mr. and Mrs. Lutters (percussion) from Fayetteville-Manlius.

From August 5-9, the Westhill Band Camp student-musicians joined together for a weeklong concert band program and culminated their week of rehearsals with a band concert for friends and family, conducted by Mrs. Buell and Mrs. Tapia, and assisted by the Westhill Camp Counselors. 6th-9th grade students rehearsed in two separate ensembles for five evenings on a fun and challenging variety of concert band pieces. For the first time, the Summer Band Camp also featured a jazz component: Mr. Riley led the Westhill Band Camp 8-10th grade Jazz Combo through performances of works by Duke Ellington, Al Jackson and Thomas "Fats" Waller; he was supported by high school and college-age jazz counselors.

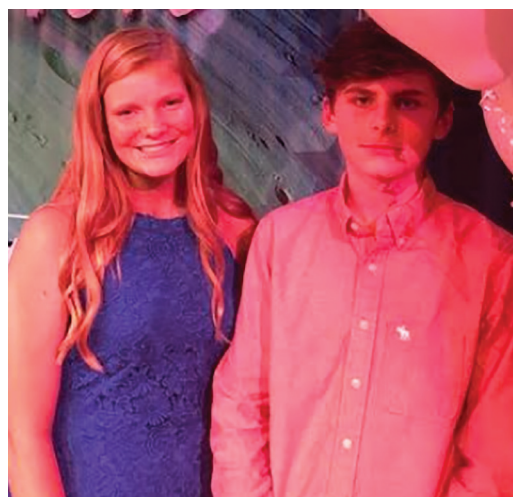
7th Grade: Bryce Burdick is a great kid. He is very conscientious about those around him and always willing to help. He raises everyone's spirits with his witty sense of humor.

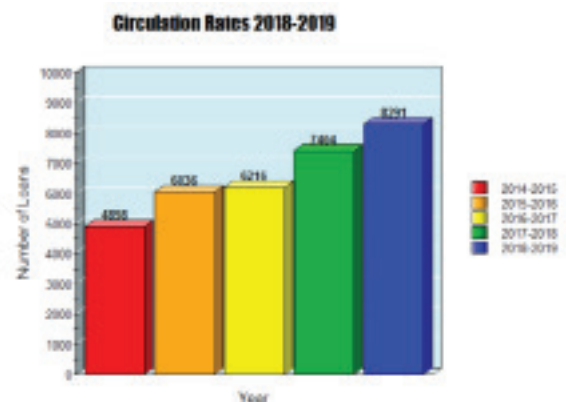
Tara McMahon Award

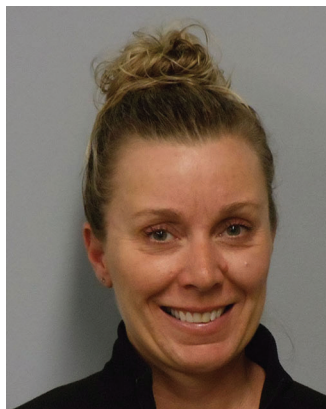

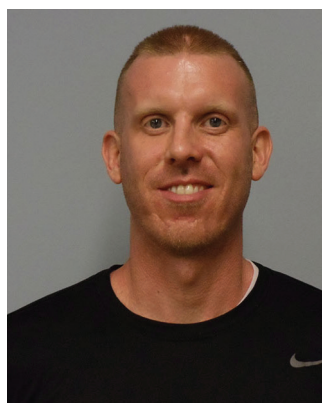

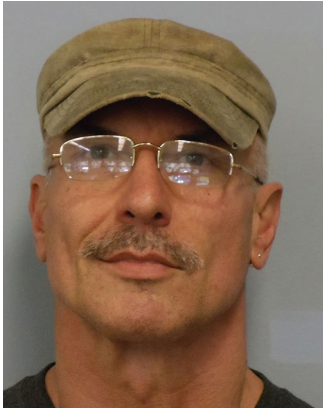

I. Introduction

Providing an orderly plan for dealing with an emergency is part of the responsibility of Westhill Central School District officials. Emergency situations range from man-made problems such as power outages, fires, and bomb threats, to nature-made situations like windstorms, ice/snow storms, and floods. Emergencies range from highly dangerous, life-threatening situations to problems that are mere inconveniences. School and parents need to have general plans for dealing with a wide range of emergencies. The following information is intended to familiarize you with our general procedures for school emergencies.

II. Possible Response Actions

The nature of the emergency will determine the type of response action. If possible and timely, an emergency response team will convene at a command site to implement response actions. If possible and appropriate, the assistance of the fire department, ambulance, and police will be sought. The primary consideration in determining response actions will be the health and safety of students and staff.

A) Cancellation of School - School officials may determine that school will not be in session for one or more days due to an emergency.

B) Evacuation - Evacuation is necessary for situations ranging from routine fire drills to conditions where it is no longer safe or appropriate to have students in the school building. Evacuation requires all building occupants to exit the building and wait a safe distance from the building until the danger has passed. In some circumstances, however, the nature of the emergency may deem that the students be transported and held temporarily at another location.

C) Early Dismissal - An early dismissal is announced in the event of a system failure such as loss of heat or other utility in the building, or in response to inclement weather. In inclement weather, due to the time it takes to coordinate early dismissal, many times it is better to wait until dismissal time to send students home. Road crews normally schedule their time to coincide with the dismissal time of schools.

D) Sheltering in Building - School officials may decide to keep students in school in an emergency until the situation returns to normal or until dismissal or evacuation can be arranged, if it is determined that it is not safe to send them home. A lock down drill is a type of sheltering situation where students remain in their classrooms and windows and doors are locked.

III. Communication Systems

Internal: Communication inside the building will be via the public address system if possible. Otherwise, messengers will be used to relay warnings. Administrators have access to cell phones/radios to assist them with emergency communications.

External: In the event of an emergency, we will notify the following television stations: 3 - NBC, 5 - CBS, 9 - ABC and 10 - YNN.

Westhill CSD uses SchoolMessenger to keep in touch with you via text message regarding important events, closings, and alerts. Please ensure that your information is up to date in PowerSchool. If you aren't receiving texts and would like to, you can sign up by texting "Y" or "Yes" to the number 67587.
