PBIS at Cherry Road School

Cherry Road School is continuing to promote positive student behavior with the Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) framework. The goal is to create a safe, respectful, and responsible learning environment for everyone. Throughout the first weeks of school, students participated in lessons that focus on these three core principles, and they're learning what these expectations look like in places like the hallways, the playground, and in the cafeteria. By clearly defining and teaching expectations, students know exactly what is expected of them, which helps to reduce misbehavior and create a more positive atmosphere. This approach also gives staff a consistent way to recognize and reward students who are making good choices. We look forward to seeing our students thrive as they build these positive habits, both in school and in the community.





Westhill Summer Band Camp and Jazz Camp!

During the last week of July, 115 camper-musicians, 45 counselors, and five music educators from Westhill, Bishop Ludden, Cazenovia, Central Square, CBA, East Syracuse-Minoa, Elmwood Franklin in Buffalo, Fayetteville-Manlius, Jamesville-DeWitt, Liverpool, Lyncourt, Marcellus, Onondaga Central, Syracuse City, West Genesee, Syracuse University, Adelphi, SUNY Potsdam, University at Buffalo, and the University of Rochester, rehearsed and performed together in the Westhill Summer Band Camp and Jazz Camp at Westhill High School. The camps were hosted by Westhill Instrumental Music Department teachers, Ms. Elizabeth Buell, Ms. Erin Althen, and Mr. Corey Riley, and they were joined for the Jazz Camp by Syracuse University music educator Dr. John Coggiola.

From July 28 - August 1, the Westhill Band Camp student-musicians joined together for a week-long concert band program and culminated their week of rehearsals with a band concert for friends and family, conducted by Ms. Buell and Ms. Althen, and assisted by the Westhill Camp Counselors. 6th-9th grade students rehearsed in two separate ensembles for five evenings on a fun and challenging variety of concert band pieces. The Summer Band Camp also featured a jazz band component: Mr. Riley and Dr. Coggiola led the Westhill Band Camp 8-10th grade Jazz Ensemble through performances of works including the music of Chuck Mangione, Gregory Yasinilsky, Victor Lopez and song Gimme Some Lovin' from the Blues Brothers Movie; they were supported by high school and college-age jazz counselors.



School Calendar

ParentSquare

ParentSquare allows the district, buildings, teachers and coaches to send messages via an app, text and/or email to notify families and staff of upcoming events, emergency situations, closings and delays, general information, etc. Attendance notices K-12 are pushed out through ParentSquare each day.

SchoolTool

The district's parent portal is a password protected, secure website that offers parents and students online access to personalized information about a student's academic program and progress. Student report cards, interim reports and academic schedules are posted for students in grades 6-12. Assignments and grades for students in grades 6-12 can also be viewed through the parent portal.

I. Introduction

Providing an orderly plan for dealing with an emergency is part of the responsibility of Westhill Central School District officials. Emergency situations range from man-made problems such as power outages, fires, and bomb threats, to nature-made situations like windstorms, ice/snow storms, and floods. Emergencies range from highly dangerous, life-threatening situations to problems that are mere inconveniences. Schools and parents need to have general plans for dealing with a wide range of emergencies. The following information is intended to familiarize you with our general procedures for school emergencies.

II. Possible Response Actions

The nature of the emergency will determine the type of response action. If possible and timely, an emergency response team will convene at a command site to implement response actions. If possible and appropriate, the assistance of the fire department, ambulance, and police will be sought. The primary consideration in determining response actions will be the health and safety of students and staff.

- A) Cancellation of School School officials may determine that school will not be in session for one or more days due to an emergency.
- B) Evacuation Evacuation is necessary for situations ranging from routine fire drills to conditions where it is no longer safe or appropriate to have students in the school building. Evacuation requires all building occupants to exit the building and wait a safe distance from the building until the danger has passed. In some circumstances, however, the nature of the emergency may deem that the students be transported and held temporarily at another location.
- C) Early Dismissal An early dismissal is announced in the event of a system failure such as loss of heat or other utility in the building, or in response to inclement weather. In inclement weather, due to the time it takes to coordinate early dismissal, many times it is better to wait until dismissal time to send students home. Road crews normally schedule their time to coincide with the dismissal time of schools.
- D) Sheltering in Building School officials may decide to keep students in school in an emergency until the situation returns to normal or until dismissal or evacuation can be arranged, if it is determined that it is not safe to send them home. A lock down drill is a type of sheltering situation where students remain in their classrooms and windows and doors are locked.

III. Communication Systems

<u>Internal</u>: Communication inside the building will be via the public address system if possible. Otherwise, messengers will be used to relay warnings. Administrators have access to cell phones/radios to assist them with emergency communications.

External: In the event of an emergency, we will notify the following television stations: 3 - NBC, 5 - CBS, 9 - ABC and 10 - YNN.

Westhill CSD uses ParentSquare to keep in touch with you via text message, email or through the app regarding important events, closings, and alerts. Please ensure that your information is up to date in SchoolTool. If you are not currently receiving communication via ParentSquare, please contact the main office at your student's school building.
